Minutes of the Annual Meeting

February 2, 2025

Senior Warden Ronnie Sue Leith called the meeting to order at 11:04 AM.

Our new Vicar, The Reverend James Wyatt, led an opening prayer.

Paula Womack was appointed as clerk for the meeting.

The minutes of the Annual Meeting held on February 4, 2024, were distributed. Jeffrey Batstone moved, and Ellen Green seconded, that they be approved. The motion passed unanimously.

Louise Kernaghan presented the Treasurer's report and answered a few questions. Dana Seeger moved, and Guy Fulford seconded, that the 2025 budget, approved by the Bishop's Committee, be affirmed. The motion passed unanimously.

The new Vicar, The Reverend James Wyatt, was introduced. He talked about his background and shared what had attracted him in Faith's Parish Profile. He expressed his excitement about beginning this new ministry with us. He will serve as our Deacon in Charge until June 14, 2025, when he will be ordained to the priesthood at St. Mark's Cathedral in Seattle. James will continue working at his current job as a writer and game designer and will be with us half-time; but he emphasized that he will be available to respond to parishioners' needs. He said that his wife, Mirabella Maeve, works for the Diocese and will not always be with us on Sundays, but they are both eager to be part of our community. Next Sunday, February 9, will be James' first time leading us in Morning Prayer.

The nominees for the Bishop's Committee were introduced. Jeffrey Batstone and Louise Kernaghan will continue to serve. Kevin Mace is running for the remaining one year of Ian Woodson's term. Yori Seeger is running to fulfill the remaining two years of Paulette Waggoner's term. Candy King, Paul Quinlivan, and Kay Rawlings are running for 3-year terms. Connie Aurand moved, and Steven Randolph seconded, that this slate be elected. The motion passed unanimously. The congregation thanked the outgoing members, Ada Kornmeyer, Ronnie Sue Leith, Paul Steinke, and Dorothy Timma, for their service.

Ronnie Sue and Ellen Green will serve as delegates to this year's Diocesan Convention. Guy Fulford will be the alternate.

The new Bishop's Committee and delegates were asked to come forward, and James offered a prayer for their service. Ronnie Sue led a closing prayer, and the meeting was adjourned at 12:15.

Vicar's Report – the Rev. James Wyatt

This annual meeting marks the first anniversary of my serving at Faith! I remember last year's annual meeting with fondness, thinking about how I took the opportunity to share with you all some of the reasons that I had been excited to apply for the vicar position and even more excited to dive into the work here. These are the things I saw in your profile and highlighted at that meeting last year:

- Active and effective lay leadership who can work in partnership with a part-time priest to get the work of the church done.
- The congregation's spiritual gift of hospitality and friendliness.
- The way the church treats outreach to the community as a genuine response to God's activity in our lives.
- A commitment to justice in the church's history.
- An eagerness for more spiritual practice, richer worship, and more chances to encounter God in nature and artistic practice.
- The church hosting KitsapCon, which I saw as affirmation that I could be my authentic gamer self while serving as your priest.

The past year has confirmed my initial impressions, and I am truly delighted to be your vicar. It is hard for me to imagine a church that would be a better fit for me and my life.

Looking Back

As I reflect on the year behind us, there are three areas that stand out in my mind as the priorities of my first year. These don't align very well with the goals that the Bishop's Committee and I established in my first month, but they reflect the reality of what I think we needed in this year:

1: *Nurturing Hope and Spiritual Growth.* I feel very strongly that God's call for me in this historical moment is to help nurture hope in a world that is threatening to stamp it out. That's a call I bear in mind every week as I write my sermons, and something I think about in every interaction I have with you. Ultimately, I believe that hope is an outgrowth of a healthy spiritual life—it's a spiritual gift that flourishes in us when we are listening to the God of hope. Cultivating our spiritual life as a community as we celebrate God's ability to transform us through prayer, study, fellowship, and service has been a focus of my ministry in the past year.

2: *Building Relationships.* This is sort of the obvious first step, I guess, for doing ministry in a congregation—getting to know the congregation. I've put a lot of time and effort into making connections with you all. It was particularly important for me to forge some connections with our youth and young adults, and our monthly-ish D&D game has been a great way to do that.

3: Outreach and Visibility in the Community. I believe it's important for Faith to be a visible part of Poulsbo's community life and the broader life of North Kitsap. I attended both Kitsap Pride and Poulsbo Pride to advance that goal—to make sure that people who might be in need of a loving, welcoming community can see that we are offering it. I try to be visible (in my collar) around town as well, though I admit that I don't get out much. I've also been attending meetings and events held by the Bainbridge Island/North Kitsap Interfaith Council as a way to make connections and be seen in the community.

One of the most important ways Faith is known in Poulsbo is as the place that runs Fresh Start, which has led me to make connections with several other people and organizations who are working to address the problem of homelessness in Poulsbo. I am very happy to know that word of our good work has spread even into Seattle—people know that this is a place to get help.

Growth. This was not a goal or a priority for me, but it is true that Faith has grown in the past year, with our average Sunday attendance increasing by about 5 since last year, and trending upward over the course of the year. I attribute this to the work of the Holy Spirit; I also think that a lot of potential energy got stored up during the long interim period between regular vicars, which is now being released in vibrant and healthy activity. We still have a lot of room to grow without losing the tight-knit family feeling of this community, but we are also feeling some growing pains, particularly in the space available for Godly Play. This is a great problem to have!

Looking Ahead

As we stand at the start of a new calendar year and my second year of ministry with you, I think the road ahead looks pretty similar to last year's road. I will continue preaching about hope rooted in our connection to God. I will continue nurturing relationships with all of you, seeking opportunities to connect more deeply to those I haven't really gotten to know yet. I'll continue striving to raise our public profile. God willing, we will continue to grow.

Ministry with and on behalf of the unhoused is personally very important to me, and in the year ahead I hope to have more fruitful conversations with other faith leaders, organizations, and city officials about other ways we might be able to contribute and other sources of support for our ministries.

I'm also eager to hear from you about what you think our priorities should be for the year ahead - especially if there's something you're passionate about putting some energy into.

Senior Warden Report – Kay Rawlings

In early 2025, Faith was pleased to announce that Reverend James Wyatt had accepted the position of Vicar. James was introduced at Faith's annual meeting, where he received warm applause and enthusiastic cheers from the congregation.

Having our own Vicar meant the Faith community had much work to do while getting to know James and helping him know Faith. We focused much of the spring to welcoming James and his wife Mirabella Maeve to Poulsbo and to our Faith community, while preparing for the tasks ahead.

James joined the Faith community as Deacon in Charge (until he was ordained a priest in June). Several supply priests were scheduled to preside over the Sunday Eucharist until his ordination as priest. During this period, Vicar James consistently undertook the responsibility of preaching each Sunday, which was greatly valued by the congregation.

With James as Vicar and a Bishop Committee established, the BC began considering a bi-vocational church model by reading Mark D. W. Edington's "Bi-vocational: Returning to the Roots of Ministry." This prompted ongoing discussions with Vicar James about Faith's history, present worship, leadership collaboration, and future goals.

Over the past year, Faith's congregation and programs have expanded significantly. The Godly Play program now uses two rooms, and more people are involved in leadership, music, liturgy, and maintenance. The Monday Fresh Start program has grown and our outreach to the unhoused and underserved in Poulsbo has increased. We deeply appreciate all Faith volunteers for their dedicated service.

Faith's bible study has grown stronger and discussions have deepened, especially with the participation of Vicar James. Our Easter week worship was joyful and highlighted by Bishop Melissa Skelton's visit. Vicar James hosted an outdoor Eucharist service this summer. Faith hosted a newcomer's dinner this fall and there were meaningful grief gatherings led by Jeffrey Batstone and Paul Quinlivan. Sylvia Sepulveda continued offering weekly Centering and Welcoming Prayer. The Poulsbo Garden Club met monthly at Faith and provided us with a generous grant for our grounds' watering system. And various 12-step programs continue to meet in Faith's parish hall.

The upcoming year promises opportunities for growth and continued community engagement. We welcome your input and vision for our collective future and look forward to embracing new initiatives while honoring cherished traditions in the year ahead.

The Fresh Start Monday Program provides unhoused individuals with hot meals, showers, clothing, laundry, food pantry items, and access to donated clothing, blankets, shoes, and camping gear.

Total guests served in 2025: 905

- Jan 1-June 30 :425 guests
- July 1-Dec 31: 480 guests

New Guests this year: 62

- 42 Men
- 20 Women

Since program inception in June 2023:

- 127 individual Men
- 34 Women have been served.

Highest number of guests in a day: 32

The Fresh Start Monday program is powered by 32 active volunteers plus 4 occasional volunteers.

In 2025 the program was blessed with 4 new volunteers.

Our volunteers come from various churches including Faith, Unity, Grace (Bainbridge), St Barnabas (Bainbridge), Vinland Lutheran, and members of the community who saw our signs, or heard about us by word of mouth from friends and the Second Season Thrift store.

Outreach financial support has come from the above-named churches and their parishioners, including the children and parents of Vinland preschool during their “Thanksgiving” drive and non-monetary donations of clothing, food, shoes and camping gear from all of the above as well as local residents, Fishline’s Second Season and Kitsap Resource Center and Mental Health.

Fresh Start was also recipient of some significant monetary donations totaling \$17,350.00. The largest donation was made by a private donor and was specifically designated for a new washer and dryer including the cost of modifications and installation. The balance is to be set aside for additional capital expenses that

might benefit Fresh Start. The other donations were from another private donors, Vinland Lutheran, and Grace Episcopal. These are nonspecific for ongoing program operation.

We have been truly blessed by the many people and our supporting congregations who have been so generous with time, treasure, talent, faith, support and caring that allow us to Mondays outreach ministry.

Godly Play

Faith's Godly Play program meets on Sundays at 9am. After the sermon, children and youth rejoin their families in church. The program has grown over the past year and now includes a second room upstairs. Volunteers are welcome, and donations for educational items or setting up the new space are appreciated.

Ways to Serve

Altar: There have been a few new people serving as Eucharistic Ministers and Acolytes, with more to come in 2026!

Finance: Seeking people interested in being treasurer or willing to serve on a finance committee.

Summer Grounds Watering: There is a significant need for volunteers to help with watering in the summer.

Other volunteer opportunities include Sunday readers, Sunday streaming helpers, ushers, coffee hour hosts, Fresh Start Monday program, grounds upkeep, and general cleaning and maintenance.

Biographies of the Bishop's Committee

Kay Rawlings, Senior Warden

The first time I went to an Episcopal church was to St Mary's in Anchorage, Alaska somewhere around 1999. Having been raised a Catholic I was drawn to the familiar liturgy and the kind, easy going congregants, who were warm and welcoming. I started attending regularly with my daughter Elizabeth.

In 2013 my husband Dan and I moved to Seattle and started attending St. John the Baptist in West Seattle, and it was there I was first started serving as a Eucharistic minister and became a confirmed Episcopalian. We decided to retire in Poulsbo in 2017 and bought property on Viking Way and started building our home. My intent was to visit the various Episcopal churches around Kitsap but my first visit was to Faith and I never left.

The first time I served as Senior Warden started in 2019. Then in 2020 Covid came along and everything changed. We all learned to use Zoom and set about the task of learning how to worship and care for each other online. In the spring of 2022 Vicar Laura was called to St. Andrews in Port Angeles, and we started the search for an interim priest, eventually hiring the Rev. Beth Orling.

In 2023 I turned over Senior Warden responsibilities to Dr. Ronnie Sue Leith and turned my focus to writing Faith's profile to use for our search for a new Vicar. Once Faith's profile was complete, I worked with the search committee through the process of finding the Rev James Wyatt. And finally in 2025 I was once again called to be Faith's Senior Warden.

I am a devout follower of Jesus, the Anointed One. I consider myself to be a "Sermon on the Mount Christian" rather than a "Ten Commandments Christian." I love reading and am drawn to various theologians and biblical scholars, but I also enjoy reading mysteries. My love for the people of Faith deepens and grows each day. My hope is to be present with the Faith community as we deepen in our commitment to the Way of Jesus.

Jeffrey Batstone, Junior Warden

Jeffrey and his family have been a part of the Faith Poulsbo community since 2019. He has served in the Episcopal church during the past 15 years in different support roles, including children and families, altar, and music ministries.

In his working hours, Jeffrey Batstone LHMC EdD is a relation psychotherapist in private practice specializing in treating abuse and trauma through a body-centered approach. He is also Co-Convener for Illuman of WA, a non-profit focused on inner work with men that makes a difference in the world.

By working with the Bishop's Committee, he would like to support the Faith Poulsbo community in their growing service to bring Christ's love to the community, the neighborhood, the peninsula, and beyond.

His home is with his wife, their three children, and the animals they care for under some very tall trees here in Kitsap County.

Louise Kernaghan, Treasurer

I moved to Indianola and joined Faith Episcopal Church when I retired in 2014. In 2016 I joined the BC for a three-year term, during which time I took over the job of maintaining the checking account, becoming the Treasurer. I also began issuing the financial reports and preparing the budget, work that had previously been outsourced. I have been Treasurer for about nine years.

I sing in the choir, bake communion bread, and volunteer with the Shower program. I volunteer at the Kingston Village Green once a week; I am a member of the Kingston Friends of the Library, organizing book sales to benefit the library.

I was a cradle Episcopalian: I served on a couple vestries before we relocated from Philadelphia. I have been so impressed about the love and hospitality of our Faith community, and it is important to me to keep it going.
